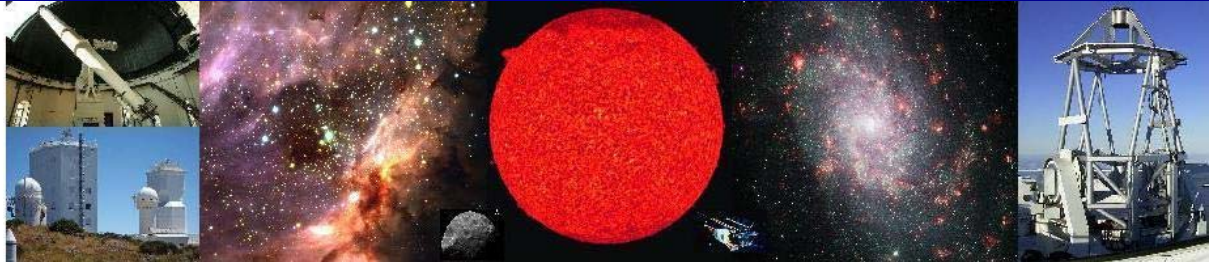

# The AG

Since 1863, the Astronomische Gesellschaft is a professional society for astronomers.

Its primary activities today are:

- Organisation of scientific meetings
- Publication of scientific literature
- Promotion of young astronomers
- Awarding of prizes in recognition of outstanding scientific achievements
- Public outreach
- Promotion of astronomical education in schools



# Organisation / Membership

- The AG is recognized as an affiliated society by the European Astronomical Society (EAS)
- Affiliated with the German Physical Society (DPG)
- The General Assembly elects the Executive Committee consisting of President, Vice President, Treasurer, Secretary, Press officer and two members without office
- Currently, the AG has ~700 members, of which ~100 are (mostly grad) students

individual members only

budget based on membership fees and small endowment



# Publications

The AG regularly publishes the following journals:

- *Newsletter (twice a year)*
- *"Mitteilungen der AG"* including annual reports of astronomical institutions, the report of the Executive Committee, and on membership development, as well as obituaries
- *"Reviews in Modern Astronomy"* featuring the key note and highlight talks given at the meetings
- conference abstracts published in *'Astronomical Notes'* (however: last issue in 2007)



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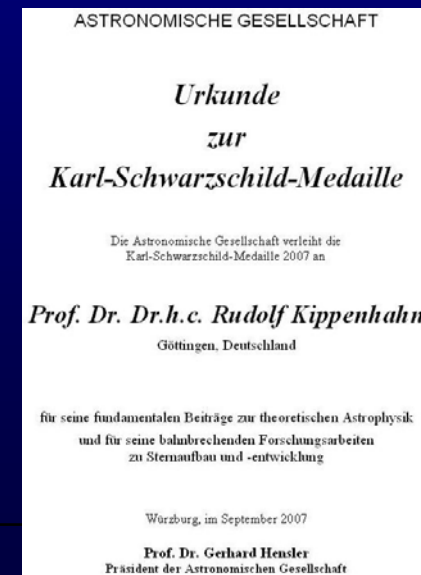
# Awards I

- *"Karl Schwarzschild Medal"* to recognize extraordinary scientific contributions (combined with the "Karl Schwarzschild Lecture")

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# Awards II

- *"Honorary membership"*  
for exceptional services to the society
- *"Ludwig Biermann Award"* (since 1988)  
to outstanding young astronomers
- *"Bruno B. Bürgel Prize"*  
for excellent popular presentations of astronomical research results
- *"Hans-Ludwig Neumann Prize"*  
(since 1996)  
in recognition of the advancement of astronomy at schools
- In addition, the AG promotes pupils as part of the  
*"Jugend forscht Award"* and invites the winners of the  
geo/science section to the next annual meeting



# Working groups

- *History of Astronomy (Astronomiae Historia)*

founded during the annual meeting of 1992

to provide information on the history of astronomy by editing publications and the undertaking of joint projects

- *School Commission*

constituted at the General Assembly of 2002

to initiate the education of astronomical topics in schools at a higher level, to generally increase the acceptance of natural sciences and to create a teacher network
